We want you to know about an important decision reached after many thoughtful and prayer-filled meetings by the Administrative Council of the United Church of Thetford (UCT).

On Aug. 26, the Council voted that going forward we will use our resources for two purposes: to worship and to give to our community. The Council instructed the UCT Trustees to divest ourselves of our two buildings: the Timothy Frost Methodist Church (TFMC) in Thetford Center and the North Thetford Federated Church (NTFC) in North Thetford. We would like to donate these facilities to a public or nonprofit entity with the hope that they will be of even greater service to Thetford.

The UCT was formed when congregations in two of Thetford's villages combined in 2008. For the past ten years, we have worshipped together and cared for our buildings. Over time, we have learned that our resources simply are not sufficient to both maintain a worship community and be good stewards of those buildings.

As the Trustees explore how to best

SCHOOL'S BACK IN SESSION ...BUT NOT HERE

Until TES opened in 1962, Thetford students attended neighborhood schoolhouses. Some you know. These, maybe not.



The 1803 schoolhouse in East Thetford sat on the eastern side of Route 5. It was East Thetford's second schoolhouse; the first operated as early as 1773.



In 1900, the school superintendent claimed that Rice's Mills' first schoolhouse was "not a fit place for cattle, and it is not as good a building as many barns. It is cold, unhomelike and barren." When the town tried to move this one in 1931, it collapsed. Its replacement is now the Rice's Mills Community Center on Route 132.



The tiny Cream Street school, on Route 132, closed in 1894 because of its poor condition and lack of students.
