THETFORD ENERGY COMMITTEE REDUCE AIR LEAKS WITH EASY-TO-INSTALL FOAM GASKETS

Light switches and electrical outlets on exterior walls can let in cold air in the winter. Use inexpensive foam gaskets to insulate switch boxes and outlets for energy efficiency and to reduce uncomfortable drafts. These gaskets cost less than 25 cents apiece and can keep cold air out and warm air inside your home. Just follow these steps:

- Take an inventory of light switches and electrical outlets on your exterior walls. How many of each type of design (e.g., single or double switch) do you need to insulate?
- Purchase gaskets at your local hardware store.
- The gaskets are composed of fireretardant foam precut to fit outlets and switch plates. Before installing, you may need to punch out the pieces where the switch or outlet will fit.
- Important: Use the circuit breaker to turn off power to outlets/switch boxes before installing gaskets!
- Use a screwdriver to remove screws and switchplate or outlet cover.
- Put the foam gasket in place, lining up the holes so that the outlets are exposed (or so the gasket fits over the light switch(es)).
- Replace the outlet cover/switch plate and secure with screws.
- You can also install child safety plugs in unused outlets to further reduce drafts.

• Turn the power back on using the circuit breaker.

If you still feel a draft, you may need to seal cracks or gaps around the wall plate with caulk or putty.

Thetford Academy burned 76 years ago this month, on November 14, 1942. The fire destroyed the 1818 academy, the Burton Hall dormitory, and Latham Library as Thetford residents and students scurried to save books and furniture. There were no fatalities. Coal in the academy's cellar smoldered for months, even as students returned to school in borrowed quarters just one week later. The new school opened across the street in 1949.
