THETFORD ENERGY COMMISSION **ENERGY TIP FOR JULY**

Join your neighbors who are already members of the first two community solar projects and get your electricity from the sun. Thetford Energy Committee is launching a third Community Solar array. It works like a co-op. Households or businesses buy and own their share of the panels and get electricity at a discounted rate. The 2019 Federal Tax Credit of 30% will give a savings of almost \$850 per share! (This will be reduced from 2020 on.)

How many shares should I buy? A family of 4 uses about 600 kWh/ month = 5 shares or about 5 kW to cover your total energy use. Households vary. Each share will give you about \$209 per year of power. Financing available.


